
## **Tridentine Community News**

September 8, 2024 - Sixteenth Sunday After Pentecost

All Windsor Latin Masses Relocated to Holy Name of Mary Church



The new pastor of the Windsor Heritage Family of Parishes, Fr. Timothy Scott, C.S.B., has asked the St. Benedict Tridentine Community to relocate all of its Masses to Holy Name of Mary Church at 681 McEwan Ave. While the 2:00 PM Mass on First Sundays of the month and the weekly Tuesday 7:00 PM Mass were already being held at Holy Name of Mary, the 2:00 PM Masses on Second through Last Sundays of the month have heretofore been held at St. Alphonsus Church in downtown Windsor. Effective immediately, however, every Sunday (as well as Tuesday) Mass will be held at Holy Name of Mary.

We are sad to have to leave the ornate and historic St. Alphonsus Church, but there is a bright side: there are no longer any Novus Ordo Masses being held at Holy Name of Mary, so the Latin Mass will essentially have exclusive use of the church. That has certain advantages, particularly less effort having to be expended in setting up the church before Mass and less takedown afterwards.

Named after Pope St. John XXIII's 1962 Apostolic Constitution encouraging the study of Latin, the Véterum Sapiéntia Institute offers several on-line courses and specializations, including Canon Law and Liturgy. A Teaching License in Ecclesiastical Latin is

The Latin Mass Society of England and Wales has long offered a variety of Latin training opportunities. First, there are periodic residential (i.e. several days, in person, on-site) training classes, often held in the summer. 
Second is a simpler set of recorded videos geared towards teaching the Latin employed in several popular prayers. The entire course is intended to take 16 weeks:
