Tridentine Travelogue Toronto Part 1 of 2: The Toronto Oratory

It has long surprised this writer that the one city that most Catholics on both sides of the Detroit River seem to visit more than any other is not Chicago, not New York, not Orlando, but... Toronto. This is, of course, especially pronounced among residents of Windsor, who find themselves traveling to Toronto for business, personal, and medical reasons. So it's worth examining...what is the liturgical scene like in Toronto?

Much like St. John Cantius dominates the liturgical scene in Chicago, like St. Agnes does in Minneapolis-St. Paul, and, indeed, like the London Oratory does in London, England, the Toronto Oratory of St. Philip Neri is ground zero for the Tridentine Mass in Canada's largest city.

The Toronto Oratory administers two parishes, Holy Family and St. Vincent de Paul. Both offer the Traditional Latin Mass: St. Vincent once per week (Sunday 9:30 AM Low Mass), and Holy Family daily (Monday-Friday 11:30 AM Low Mass, Saturday 8:30 AM Low Mass, Sunday 11:00 AM Solemn High Mass).





Holy Family [pictured] is a rather small church, similar in size to or possibly slightly smaller than St. Alphonsus in Windsor. It is rather stark and devoid of much religious imagery. The altar is freestanding. The tabernacle is kept behind a gate, similar to a Byzantine church's iconostasis. Holy Family is located next to a sketchy neighborhood, but the campus is immaculately maintained and includes an elementary school. Parking is not easy; one must park along the street, as there does not appear to be a parking lot. However, streetcars serve the neighborhood, so public transit may actually be a better option for getting there.

Holy Family, like the Oratorian churches in England, is known for its sacred music program, multiple choirs, and regular concerts. Vespers [in the Ordinary Form] is offered on Sundays at 5:00 PM, accompanied by music in Latin.

The Oratory also operates St. Philip's Seminary, perhaps best known for training the seminarians of the expansive St. Michael's Abbey in Orange County, California. The seminarians are often seen assisting at the two Oratory parishes.

Longer term members of St. Benedict Tridentine Community may recall that one of the Oratory priests, Fr. Thomas Trottier, had family in Windsor and would occasionally celebrate Masses for us during his visits home. The founder of the Oratory, the late liturgical scholar and author Fr. Jonathan Robinson, celebrated St. Benedict's 20th Anniversary Mass in 2011 at Assumption Church.
